Using Kid Pix

Duplicate the project directions, mount them on cardboard, laminate them, and place them next to the computer. The projects are written at a primary level and encompass the different disciplines found in the primary grades. As students work on the projects, they will also be honing their computer skills. A certificate for your mother for Mother's Day is a wonderful present to give. First of all, it is from you and tells your mother that you know about all the nice things that she does for you.

- 1. Think about all the many things that you mother does for you. She makes your meals, helps you with homework, takes you to places you need to go, and, most of all, she loves you. What would you like to tell her on this special day?
- 2. First, make the frame for the certificate and then write the message.
- 3. There are several frames to choose from.



 Select Rubber Stamps and find a stamp that would look good as a frame. It might be a bow, maybe the sun, or anything that would look good repeated. Click on the rubber stamp and stamp it all around the edges of the screen to make a frame.



 Select Wacky Brush and choose one of the options that would make a good frame. The bubbles might be good or maybe the hands, bows, or hearts from the options menu.



- Another frame choice might be to make straight lines with the Straight Line tool in different colours and put rubber stamps in each corner.
- 4. Type in what you want to say to your mother.



- 5. Use the Typewriter tool or select Goodies and choose Type Text. Choose a colour from the colour palette before you start typing in your message. You could even have many different colours in your message.
- 6. Print your certificate for your mother. Select Print from the File menu.

What Else Can I Do?

- 1. Make certificates for friends and other relatives.
- 2. You can make certificates for winners of games and for awards from clubs.
